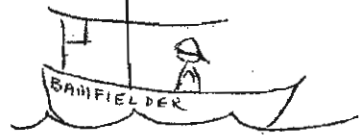

## LIGHTS TO GO ON IN GRAPPLER

Linemen from the Construction Department of B. C. Hydro are in Grappler Inlet installing power lines.

Local electrician, Bob Peel said that he has completed the wiring of 5 houses and expects to have the remaining 3 ready shortly. Fourteen householders have contracted to take power from Hydro. Some of these houses are already up to standard.

Speaking for Hydro, A. E. Grozell, Line Supervisor, Port Alberni, said that although all the houses are not yet wired, "this won't hold us back."

Mr. Grozell said, "The line connections should be completed by April 30 and any houses that are up to electrical standards and inspected should have power by that time."

## WHALE OF A STORY

A couple of whales have been sighted in Bamfield Inlet in the past few days. The first was reported on April 1, but it wasn't a joke. At least not to Sharon Logan who spotted a whale at 6 o'clock that morning about 30 feet from her boat as she was starting out across the Inlet on her way to work.

The whale was masquerading as a log between the fish camp float and the fire barge. When 'the log' dove, Sharon began to think that perhaps she should call it a day. "I waited around for at least five minutes after that," she said. Then she slowly edged her boat towards the second float, hoping that the coast was clear. The whale must have had the same thought. 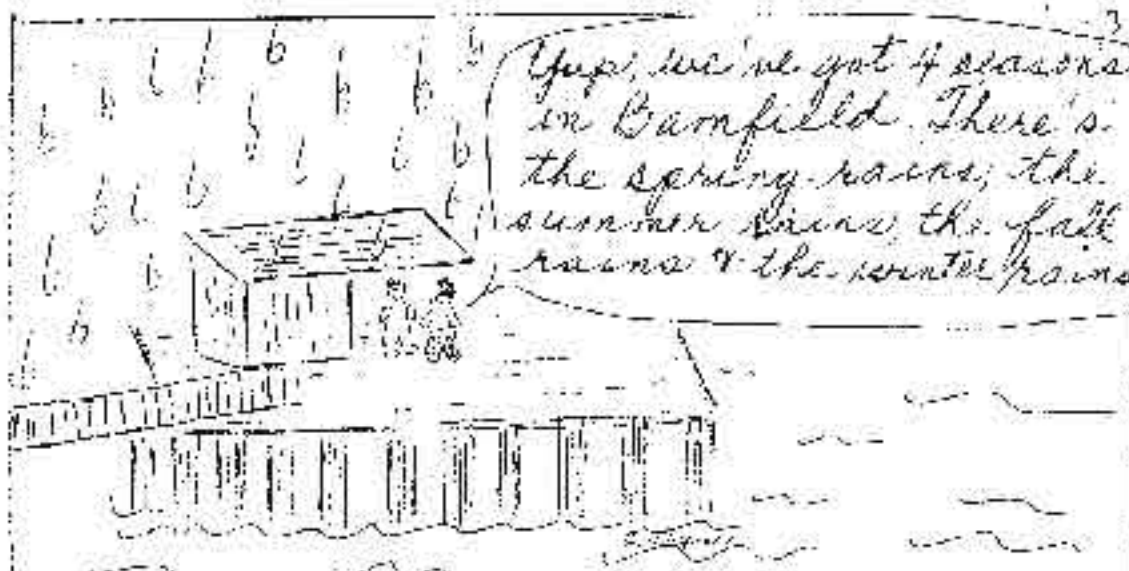

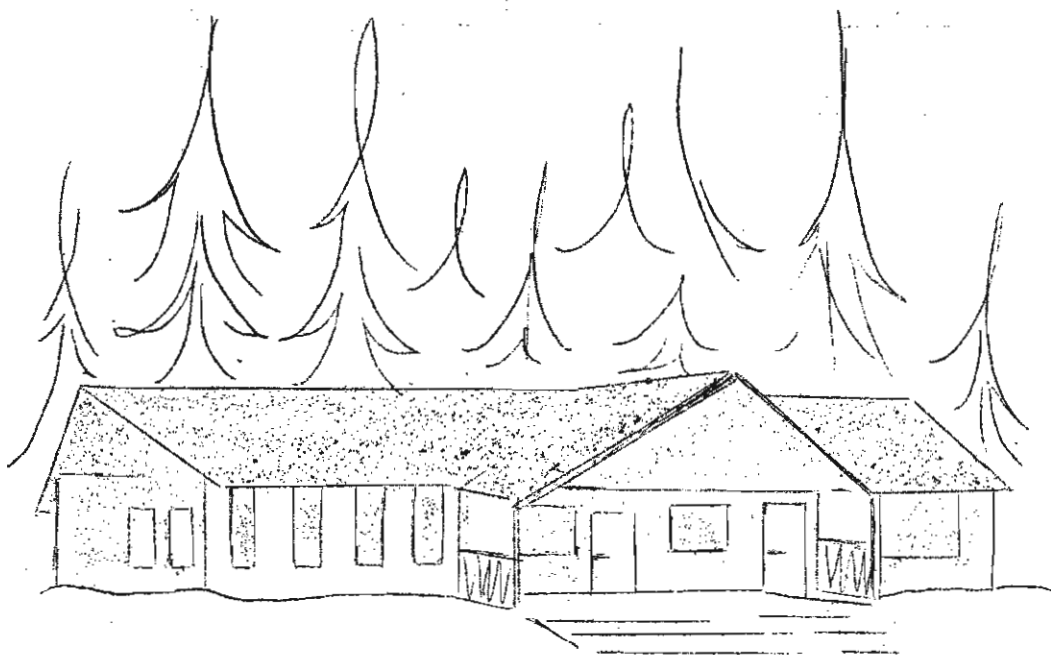
P. S.: Sharon made it to work.

## IT'S A LONG DAY AT DEALE

Alex Thomson at Cape Beale Light is getting up pretty early these days.

With the start of herring season this year, Alex's schedule moves from 5 weather reports a day to 8. He expects this will continue until the end of fishing season. These reports include sky conditions, visibility, wind speed and direction, sea conditions and height of swells.

Alex radios his 8 reports to Totino starting at 3:45 am and ending at 7:30 pm. With typical understatement, Alex says, "It's a long day."

Totino broadcasts the official marine forecast at 1630 kilocycles four times a day at 0545, 0645, 1130 and 1950.

If you want local weather conditions from Carrizosa to Cape Scott, there are broadcasts on 1630 eight times a day at 0425, 0535, 0645, 0850, 1150, 1520, 1730 and 1950.

When we go to Daylight Saving Time on April 25, these broadcasts will be given an hour later.

Alex says that he has found that most coast radios are able to receive the marine forecast if the dial is turned past 1600.

## SCHOOL BOARD REQUESTS TO RENAME THE PLAYFIELD

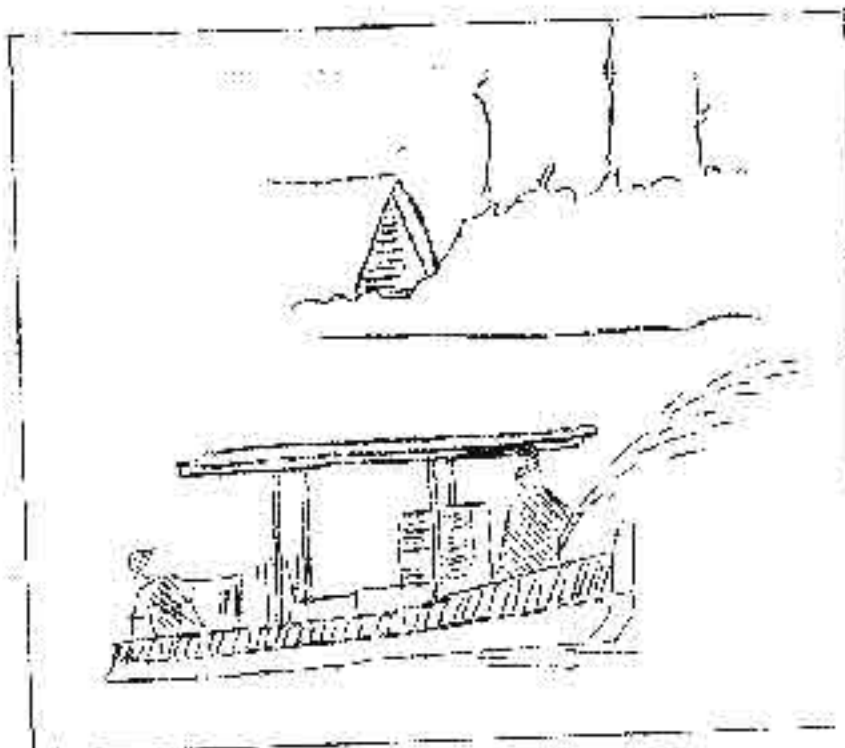
In October, 1975, Dolores Bowker, Jacquie Garcia and Pat Garcia met with school board officials in Port Alberni to request that the title of the playfield land be put in Samfield's name.

In a letter dated March 19, 1976, Ron Lydas, Superintendent of School District #70 responded to that request as follows:

"The School Board feels that it is trustees of the property on behalf of the people of Samfield. Any sale or transference of this property would not be possible. Any reasonable community use that was designed and supported by Samfield people would be approved by the School Board.

"Certainly, reconstruction of the area for use as a playing field or playground would be considered reasonable use."

CAPE BEALE FIELD TRIP

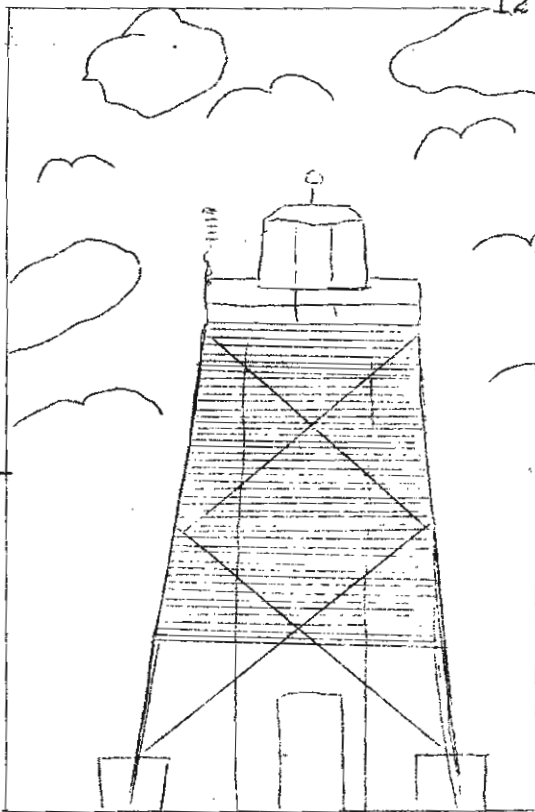

On Friday, March 5, we went to Cape Beale. Twenty-four people went. The trail was worse than we thought it would be. In places, there was mud up to our knees. Three times, Lee had to pull me out of the puddles. On the trail half-way there, I took my first picture. It was a good view.

We got to Long Beach at about 9:05. I had a pop and went to collect some rocks and shells. When we started on the trail again it was really bushy and muddy. There was one part that was the worst spot for me. I fell into a mud puddle face flat. We saw some deer tracks. Some people thought they saw one, but really didn't.

We went through a swamp and walked on a bridge for about 2 minutes. There was a sign that said you were "Almost There". But it still was a long time before we got there. Before we got to Cape Beale, there was a little generating shed. The shed had a skyride on it but we didn't go. We walked up a flight of stairs.

When you stand on the rock you get a real good view. Then we walked around for a little while before we sat down and ate lunch. After lunch we went on a tour of



the lighthouse. Only 5 people at a time could go and I was in the first group. While we were eating our lunch we saw some California Gray Whales. One of the windows is a red visor. The visor makes it easier for the boats and big ships to see near the reef. After that we went and looked at a Port Angeles helicopter. We each got turns going in and being the pilot and moving the gears and wearing the helmets. The helicopter weighs 6000 pounds, approximately 3 tons.

There was a whale rubbing itself along the bottom of the float trying to scrape off barnacles "the size of coffee mugs" that were growing on its back. David and the late Jeff Phillips got a couple of bars and tried to drive the whale away. But they could have been pebbles like that for all the difference it made. "I can tell you," said David, "we didn't go swimming for a few days after that."

David can also remember about 15 years back when a small whale was caught at low tide at the far end of the Inlet in front of the Happonook's place. When it died, a few people tried whale steak for the first time. Knut Olavsen, now a resident of Port Alberni, told people how to prepare the meat by hanging it in a plastic bag for a couple of days before cooking. David reports that it tasted pretty good.

Asked to comment on the whales that have been sighted in the Inlet, Dr. J. S. McInerney, director of the Seaford Marine Station said, "Given the time of year, they were probably Gray Whales. Historically, there have been Killer Whales, Humpbacks, the Minke or Little Piked Whale, as well as the Gray in Barkley Sound. So far as I can determine, there are no records of other species in this area."

At Long Beach, Lee and I were standing on a big rock when suddenly, a giant wave came in and got us soaked. On the trail we stopped and had a slug of water, but then we were on our way again.

When we got to Shaw's, we all got in the buses and drove off home.

\*\* Pat Garcia, Ramfield Regional Board representative reported on her meeting with the Technical Planning Board re Crown Land in Ramfield. The Technical Planning Board will be looking into the feasibility and cost of sewage, water and roads. Pat stated they would not open Crown land without it being serviced, probably by a sewage system. The Lands Branch is to do the survey.

\*\* Fire Chief, Dave Christney reported that Ramfield is temporarily without an alarm system. The Fire Dept. is looking into the possibility of obtaining a civil defence alarm which would be triggered by a phone call. Should one be obtained, the number would be unlisted and known only to the fire chief and his assistant. In the meantime, in case of fire, the number remains the same, 728-8211, and will be answered in the home of the fire chief and assistant chief.

\*\* A.P.C. Elections - elected to a two-year term on the APC were Dale Garcia, Dave Hegstrom and Dave Christney. Pat Garcia moved a vote of thanks to Uba Jennings for her tremendous help even before the APC was formed.

\*\* Dr. J. McInerney reported the carpenters are busy at the Marine Station. Two cottages are being renovated to give kitchen facilities to graduate students and two are being converted to accommodate married couples with families. To offset the reduction in quarters for single students, a triple trailer unit is being purchased. This will accommodate 20 students. Work should be completed by late May and members of the community are welcome to come and take a look.
