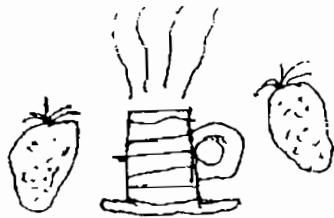

Listen To The Stories



Excerpts from the Williams Lake
'Tribune'

Long ago stories were told to entertain people and to keep the history of a community alive for future generations. Richard Wright and Cathryn Wellner are modern day storytellers who will share their stories and music.

The stories are on subjects as old as mankind," says Wellner. "Stories of fidelity and love, of courage and faith, of fear and insecurity. I try to make my listeners understand the stories at the level of their hearts." Her special interest is in contemporary stories she draws from her own observations and experiences.

Wellner's business card has read simply "Storyteller" for several years and her stories have entertained audiences across the United States and western Canada. Wellner also served for six years on the board of the National Association for the Preservation and Perpetuation of Storytellers.

The couple live on a 1911 dairy farm near Duncan. Wright is a well-known B.C. outdoors author, who credits his name with guide books on canoeing, cross-country skiing and hiking.

In addition a book titled "The Overlanders" is popular in the Cariboo for its study of gold seekers of this area.

Together, Wellner and Wright weave stories using brightly colored thread of blended song and words intended to lift the spirit. Storytelling is the basis of art, say the couple, as a story looms behind every individual's life.

Whale & Raven

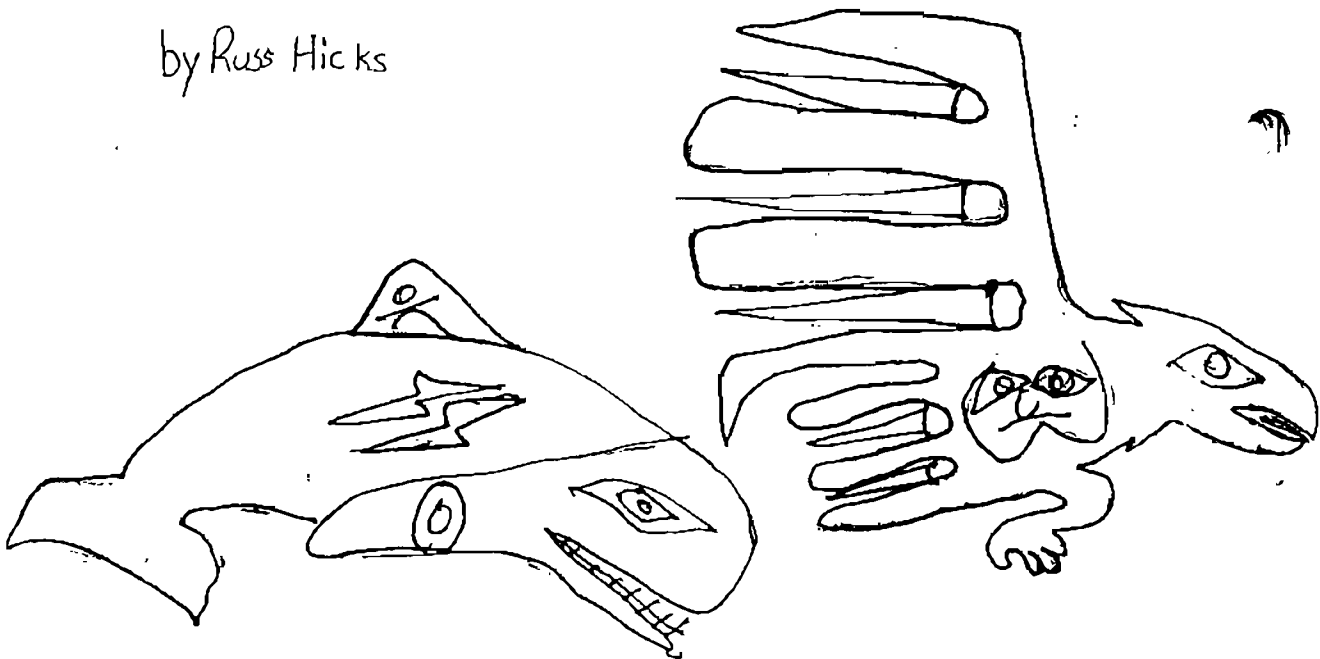

Once, along time ago there was a big, old, fat, grumpy, greedy bear that lived in a cave under a shady tree.

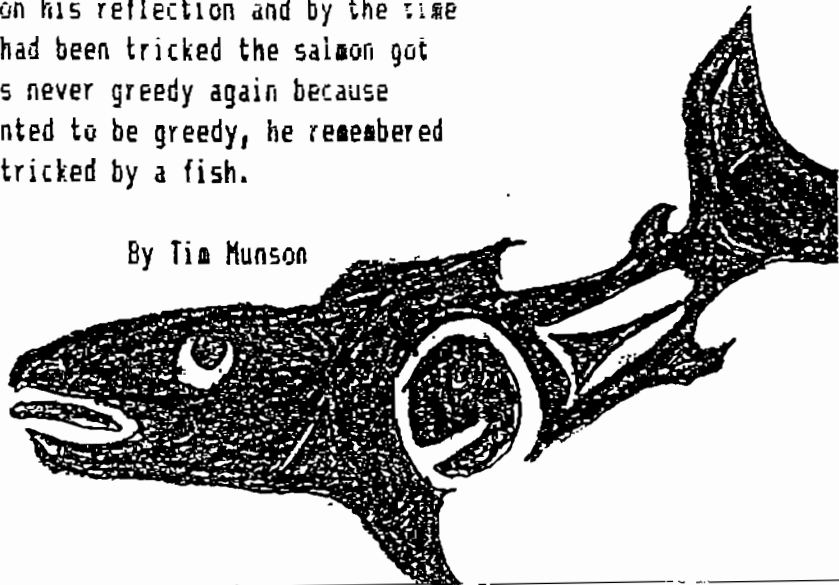
One sunny morning he decided to go exploring. On his way he saw a deep river. He wanted to go to the other side. He quickly jumped on a log and almost fell off, but he held on.

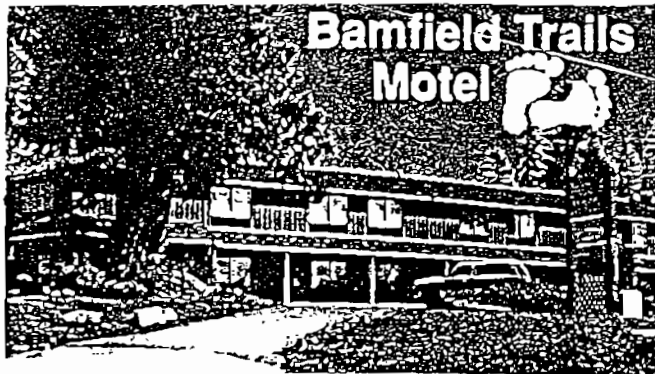
Once he was on the other side he saw a big, fat salmon. The salmon was very smart and tricky. The bear quickly jumped on him. He caught him!
