Thirty-eight adults, one youngster and one dog attended the June 26th Community Affairs meeting.

The main item on the agenda was the Bamfield Settlement Plan (formerly Community Plan) Regional Planner Bill Brown was in attendance to present the Plan and answer questions from residents.

As the Plan is 40 pages long, I will only quote Plan Objectives and Program Recommendations.

"The objectives for conservation and development of the

Bamfield Community are:

- To maintain the special character of the Bamfield community.
- To protect the environment from pollution and enhance land having special value.
- To preserve and add to the existing pattern of development."

These objectives are enlarged on in the "Summary of Plan Policies". Generally, the policies outline moderate growth for Bamfield. That

growth is expected to follow much the same pattern as in the past, with an emphasis on water transportation. Thus, an infill pattern, using available land within the present settlement area first, and then expanding down the two inlets in a linear pattern, is the proposed mode of residential development.

The entire plan is geared to the preservation of the flavour of Bamfield as a water oriented community.

The Program Recommendations further this objective. They are:

- acquisition of Brady's Beach for a park;
- realignment of road rights-of-way to conform with road (and path) network;
- development of a Crown Land Subdivision;
- making the Federal Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program available to home owners
- requestion low cost loans for home improvements."
- Two new recommendations were added by the meeting:
- "-that Bamfield not become the focal centre of the Pacific Rim National Park but merely be an adjunct to it;
- that new servicing systems for problem topography and soil be investigated

with an eye to allowing their implementation in new development as an alternative to present septic systems."

The one major bone of contention was the sentence, "The Settlement Plan does not allow for development of licensed premises selling or serving liquor to the public." It was pointed out that this is in direct conflict with a recent News Release from the Liquor Distribution Branch with sets Bamfield as one of the areas in line for an Agency Liquor Store. (See story this issue) It was also pointed out that liquor licenses (except for Neighbourhood Pubs) do not

some before the Regional Board and therefore this clause would be extremely difficult to enforce. The feeling of the meeting seemed to be that the only premises that would be objected to by the community would be pubs or lounges, where patrons could simply sit and drink. This sentence will be altered in the final version of the Plan.

A Public Hearing to vote on the Plan and two zoning changes is planned for August. As there won't be a Community Affairs meeting until then, please watch for notices and expect a phone call as to the date and time.

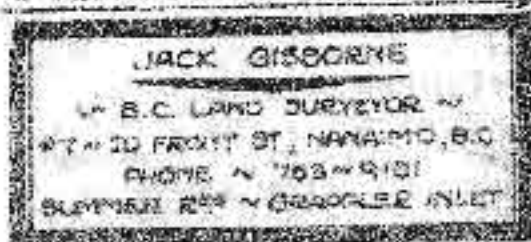

## Agency Liquor Stores

NEWS RELEASE

Liquor Distribution Branch

The Liquor Distribution Branch will soon be accepting applications for "Agency" Liquor Stores from private businesses located within 26 specified remote areas in British Columbia. Consumer and Corporate Affairs Minister Rafevair announced June 23, 1978.

Agency Stores are retail sales or tourist oriented businesses, usually small grocery or general stores located in rural areas. They have a two year renewable contract to sell a minimum of 30 liquor products at the same price as regular government liquor stores.

There are presently 21 Agency Stores in the province. The decision to expand this

program is based on a review of current liquor store facilities in all remote areas in B.C.

"The review showed that while service should be provided to consumers in the areas selected", the Minister said, "it would be impractical for the Branch to establish regular government liquor stores there at this time."

"The small one or two person government liquor store in a rural area is often inconvenient for consumers as well because it is not open a sufficient number of hours per week", Mr. Mair continued. "A one person store, for instance, is closed Mondays and lunch hours and is not open any evenings."


"Our experience with the existing agencies is universally good, so we are now going to expand the program based on the need to provide a service to consumers in designated rural areas."

They also cannot have any interest in any enterprise which manufactures or sells liquor. The area in which the liquor is kept must be separate from the rest of the store and only people over 19 years of age can handle the liquor. The Liquor Distribution Branch will publicly advertise for Agency Store applications in those areas that currently have more than one retail business.

## Cooks' Corner

During our very successful "Ethnic Night" season we had a "Greek Night". Several people expressed interest in the recipe for Moussaka. This is one of the most authentic recipes I have tasted. It was given to me by a friend who has a restaurant in Greek town Detroit, Michigan and I have reduced it.

Cook 1 large, minced onion in 3 tbsp. butter with 1 tsp. salt and  $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp. pepper for 5 minutes. Add 1 lb. ground beef and  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb. ground pork, 1 clove minced garlic and cook until

browned. Add 1 cup tomato paste,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup cold water,  $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp nutmeg and cook 15 minutes. Heat oven to 350°. Heat  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup salad oil in frying pan. Mix  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup flour,  $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp. salt and  $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp. pepper and coat 2 medium eggplants that have been pared and cut lengthwise into  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch slices. Fry until light brown. Place  $\frac{1}{2}$  of slices in 13"x9"x2" glass baking dish; spread with  $\frac{1}{2}$  of meat sauce. Repeat layers. Beat 1 large egg,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup milk,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup heavy cream, and 1/8 tsp. nutmeg. Heat mixture till it starts to thicken, stirring constantly. Pour over casserole. Sprinkle with  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup parmesan cheese and place in oven. Bake 20-30 minutes or until custard sets and is browned on top. Serves 6.

Serve with greek salad, feta cheese, greek olives, dry wine and crusty bread.

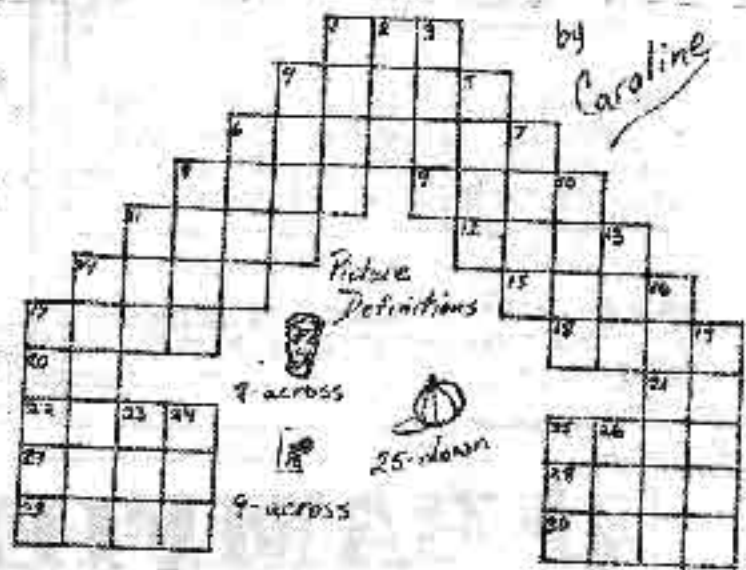

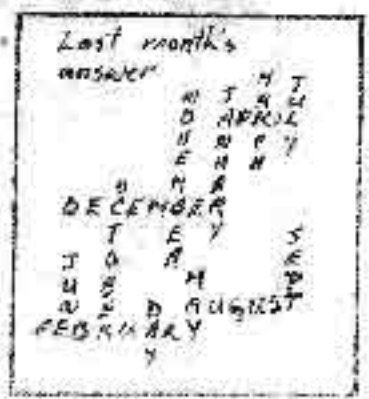
